

"PROMISES, PROMISES"







I love the so called promises in the paragraph that begins at the bottom of page 83 and continues at the top page 84 of the big book. I frequently quote one or another of them. I often mention them in an AA qualification.

That's why I was please recently to receive a scroll containing "The Promises", inscribed in beautiful calligraphy, as a souvenir of an AA dinner I attended. And then as I admired the scroll it set me to thinking. We are certainly hearing more about "The Promises" these days. I've seen them printed in AA meetings as a wall plaque like the Steps and Traditions. And maybe on a wallet card.

Is this the trend in our fellowship-this lifting the promises out of context and inscribing them in bronze? Are we sanctifying the promises?

If so, it troubles me. I view such a trend with alarm. Why?

Because, first of all, if we go back to the source and read the paragraph of the Big Book containing the promises, it is immediately clear that they were not intended to be set apart. They are not written as a separated element as are the Steps and the Traditions. They are buried in the text (and within the context) and for a reason: They are part of a discussion of how to work the steps, really, but specifically the first nine. The paragraph in question follows a long description of a mess our alcoholic lives are in and advice on how to work our way out.

Second, these are not unconditionally promises as they seem to be when set apart. Quite the contrary. They are a spontaneous, almost euphoric expression of experiences of the authors with the rewards that can be expected "If we are painstaking about this phase of our development". "What phase?" The working of the first nine Steps as described in the preceding twenty-four pages.

And how many of us have actually worked the Steps that way? How many of us for example, in doing our Fourth Step inventory, have followed the example in the Big Book?

A written "grudge list" in three separate columns, analyzing the causes of each resentment and how it affects us. Not I. How many of us took Step eight and nine with diligence and thoroughness recommended in detail from page 76 to page 83 in the Big Book? Not I. Yet we must recognize that is what is meant by being "painstaking."

What the Big Book is saying on page 83 is that if we have completely reconstructed our relationship with others, then "we will not regret the past....," and so on through the rest of the promises. In fact, it says "they will always materialize if we work for them." And the rest of that chapter is devoted to telling us how to continue to work for them by practicing Step Ten and Eleven.

Finally, it seems to me that when I quote the promises so glibly and smugly (as I am inclined to do), I may actually be playing down the Steps. Am I glorifying end results while ignoring the footwork necessary to get there? It is easier and more comforting to take refuge in the promises (lifting them out of context) then to go through the purging and the pain of taking the first nine Steps-which are clearly prerequisites of the promises, consciously or unconsciously, as "an easier, softer way."

So let's read and reread Chapters Five and Six (along with the rest of the Big Book, naturally!) And when we get to the beautiful section of pages 83 and 84, let's cherish the promises rewards set forth there. Let's carry them in our minds and hearts as a joyous and inspiring part of our program of recovery.

But let's not sanctify the promises.

THE NINTH TRADITION:

"A.A., as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve."

The two words that describe the ninth tradition in my life are "divine order". When I let go and stop trying to do the organizing and let God show me what to do, "divine order" takes over in my life. Let us ask ourselves the following questions about order in our lives as we prepare for next week:

- 1. What is the state of my divine order? Do I try to organize myself and others? Do I give orders, or am I suggestive? Am I rigid and over-controlled, or do I allow myself to be spontaneous.
- 2. Do I try to control order, or am I willing to surrender to God's divine order which is beyond my control and understanding? Can I afford to be spontaneous since God is in charge?
- 3. Do I try to organize God within the limits of my understandings? Am I open to seemingly unorganized direction if it is God's will for me?
- 4. Am I driven by a desire to be in control or a desire to give service?

The Steering Committee minutes for July 10, 2017 were reviewed. Motion by Phil to approve; seconded by John. Approved.

The Intergroup Rep meeting minutes for July 17, 2017 were reviewed.

HOTLINE REPORT: All slots are currently filled. AAs may sign up to volunteer on line or call our office.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer's Report was reviewed. Moved and seconded to approve. Passed.

INTERGROUP REPORT:

Telephone Calls: Of the 108 total calls to our office, 53 were general/office; 51 meeting requests, and four 12 step calls.

WEBSITE REPORT: Of the 1,474 visits to our website, 1,004 were new visitors and 470 returning visitors, of which 64 were from Canada, 17 from Brazil, 17 from China and 4 from India. An average visitor views 3 or 4 pages. Our webmaster, Scott, and Marcy discussed how the cell phone application can be more accessible to users. John B suggested we stop reporting any data on non-USA visitors.

OLD BUSINESS:

Meeting Schedule Format: We sold 463 of our original format schedules, and 110 of the new format arranged by area.

Discussion requested of including a map on our meeting schedule or arranging by zip code. Basically, arranging by zip code generally not suggested. Including a map might be an option if space was available and did not cause adding an extra page. East/West Vancouver to be separated by 1-205 and State Route 502 North (117th Ave). All other areas are self describing.

COMMITTEES:

Finance Committee:

Intergroup Budget: Greg presented a graph of our budget at our Finance Committee meeting that meets before the Steering Committee meeting at 5:30 pm. The graph showed July's revenue and expenses in comparison to our budgeted amounts, along with graphs of the monthly financial performance and cash assets.

Fundraising Pamphlet: Greg advised he received an estimate at a print shop of \$145.

A couple of members of the Steering Committee preferred we simply print at our office (maybe on colored paper) to avoid the additional cost of printing elsewhere.

Treasurers' Workshop: Set for September 23, 2017. Flyers will be distributed.

Gratitude Dinner: John advised Intergroup that November 4, 2017 was now available. Marcy e-mailed all Reps attending our July 17th Rep meeting to advise them of the November 4 available date. Also the cook is available Nov 4 as well, and Deb T has made herself available to Chair the Gratitude Dinner. Of the 18 Reps contacted, 11 Reps replied with a yes vote. No "no" votes were received. The dinner was changed to November 4, 2017, and an updated contract has been received from the Church.

NEW BUSINESS:

<u>Volunteer/Community Service</u>: After discussion, it was decided not to make Intergroup available for those performing Community Service due to possible liability.

Office Keys: After discussion, Phil moved, Virginia seconded that the extra key be given to our new Vice-Chair, Deb T. Passed.

Jamboree Intergroup Table: After discussion, Robert moved, Phil seconded that Intergroup have a table with sales at the October 13 and 14, 2017 SW Washington Jamboree. Greg was nominated to Chair and oversee items and stock for sale on behalf of Intergroup. Passed.

Accounts Receivable: It was noted that our P&L shows a small Accounts Receivable balance. Darcy S (a visiting former Steering Committee member) stated that to her recollection a past decision by the Steering Committee was that no credit was to be extended to anyone. Marcy stated that the policy was not clear in her notes from Earlyn. It was suggested to review past Minutes, find where this decision was documented and then update our office policy in compliance with the past Minutes. Marcy was requested to review past Minutes.


